Officers Report

Secretary – Minutes of the 2019 fall meeting were published in the newsletter and on the website. Motion to approve the minutes as published was made by David Moody and seconded by Diane Bidwell. All ayes.

Treasurer – David Dettmann reported a current balance of \$8,097.28.

Minimal expense and income throughout 2020, as no meetings with the Covid 19 issue. No membership renewal charge for 2020, therefore, all members are paid through 2021 and some beyond.

Expenses include \$220.00 for website and maintenance; \$75.00 for Iowa Arboretum membership renewal; \$260.00 for liability insurance; \$250.00 for Ted Davidson scholarship; \$100.00 room rental; \$267.00 for newsletter expense; \$91.30 liability; interest earned \$47.30.

TO: Russ O'Harra Hosta Society members:

As you may have heard, the Russ O'Harra Hosta Society (ROHS) has been offered the opportunity to host the American Hosta Society National Convention in 2023. What follows is background information and an update about this exciting opportunity.

Approximately two years ago, Bob Solberg, a nationally known hosta hybridizer and lecturer, recommended central Iowa as a national convention site. An ad hoc local organizing committee discussed the possibility of a central Iowa convention with Tammy Borden, Vice President of the American Hosta Society, and made inquiries about potential meeting sites. Following the local organizing committee recommendations, AHS has made the following time-sensitive decisions:

- The AHS national convention will be held June 6 – 10, 2023
- Headquarters for the convention will be the Gateway Hotel and Conference Center in Ames

Early convention planning with the national society is underway. The 2023 AHS national convention will follow the overall format of previous conventions with motivating speakers, tours of inspiring gardens, outstanding hosta shows and clinics, offerings of the latest plants and accessories from vendors, and lots of stimulating conversations. The convention's uniquely Iowa flavor will come from choices and decisions made by a dedicated local team of leaders and volunteers. We hope that ROHS will be the leading host organization and that ROHS members like you will step up with your time and talent to make this an AHS convention to remember!

A list of potential benefits, responsibilities, and considerations relevant to hosting the convention is attached and will be presented and discussed at the ROHS Fall meeting on Sunday, October 10, at the Iowa Arboretum. We hope to see you there and encourage you to vote affirmatively to officially accept the challenge for the Russ O'Harra Hosta Society to be acknowledged as the primary host organization for the AHS 2023 National convention.

AHS National Convention Hosting Benefits and Responsibilities

Being an AHS National Convention host will require a commitment of time and expertise from ROHS leaders and members, but it is an investment that could bring growth and new life to our organization. As a convention host, ROHS has the opportunity to promote our society at local, regional, and national levels, gain new members, reinvigorate the enthusiasm of existing members, demonstrate the expertise of central Iowa hosta growers, and exhibit the beauty of our gardens.

Opportunities to Promote ROHS and Enhance Local, Regional, and National Recognition

- Recognition as a 2023 Host organization at 2022 AHS conference and in marketing and social media before the 2023 event
- Co-promotion on 2023 conference website and ROHS website
- ROHS name on signage and print materials used throughout the event
- A separate table in the 2023 Registration Area to promote ROHS activities and membership
- Recognition as hosts for Hostality sessions at the conference

ROHS Host responsibilities

- Volunteer for leadership positions
- Participate in planning and coordination
- Attend meetings as necessary
- Volunteer to help at Conference activities and recruit others to volunteer as needed
- Help recruit gardens for tours and assist garden hosts when asked
- Host Hostality events

Financial Considerations for ROHS as the Host Organization

- AHS assures that local societies/hosts will not incur a financial loss relative to the convention
- ROHS may receive a share of income from registrations. The specific amount will depend on the AHS board and the number of hosts participating
- ROHS can receive net funds from sales of conference T-shirts or other items the Society sells at the conference (not a strong money-maker)
- The conference will have a bank account separate from ROHS; the conference bank account will use the AHS non-profit organization EIN
- AHS receives proceeds from the conference Auction and Vendor commissions
- AHS will provide upfront funding for 2023 conference expenses before conference registration income. ROHS may grant upfront funds to support the conference and our activities during the conference, e.g., design and printing of T-shirts or purchases of foods for Hostality sessions

Additional Benefits for ROHS Leaders and Volunteers

- Meet and learn from AHS leaders and other experts
- Work with and learn about other ROHS members
- Experience working at a national level conference
- Gain recognition for ROHS members who choose to engage in regional or national AHS leadership
- Recognition of members' gardens and hosta expertise
- Unique conference volunteer SWAG (special T-shirt, hat, etc.) if budgeted
